As my second summer as Director comes to a close, I'm filled with deep gratitude and pride for the incredible community that makes John Island Camp such a special place. Each summer on the island feels unique, but this one stood out for the energy, laughter, and sense of connection that filled every corner of camp.

This summer, John Island was home to 496 campers, including 42 leadership participants who brought enthusiasm, curiosity, and spirit to every moment. Alongside them, a team of 40 dedicated staff members poured their hearts into creating a safe, supportive, and unforgettable camp experience making the magic of camp possible. In addition to our campers and staff, we were lucky to welcome numerous volunteers, alumni, Rotary Club members, contractors, and YMCA team members, as well as a visit from the Serpent River Day Camp. Their support and presence reminded us just how wide and caring the John Island community truly is.

We were especially proud to introduce a new three-week Greenway Leadership Program, which proved to be an incredible success. Both Greenway groups navigated the Spanish River this summer and came back with unforgettable memories, stronger friendships, and a deeper sense of leadership. We're excited to see this growth continue into our Norquay Leadership Program next year.

We also saw meaningful growth in our Youth Camp A (12-day) out-tripping program. Our oldest campers embarked on a four-day canoe trip in Elliot Lake, marking the exciting return of off-site trips for our youth campers. This step is a fantastic development for John Island—it gives our campers a chance to build on their wilderness and tripping skills earlier, setting a strong foundation for future leadership adventures.

Of course, what truly made Summer 2025 unforgettable were the people. Campers challenged themselves, discovered new passions, and formed lasting friendships. Staff poured their hearts into creating meaningful experiences, and together, we built a season filled with adventure, laughter, and growth.

John Island Camp continues to thrive because of the people who believe in it—our campers, staff, alumni, and community partners. Thank you for being part of this incredible journey and for helping us keep the John Island spirit alive year after year.

To our campers, staff, families, and alumni—thank you. Your dedication, support, and passion keep this camp thriving, and I am already excited for what Summer 2026 will bring. SCOTT'S THOUGHTS



The 2025 camp season saw many improvements and additions to John Island, some of which, if you attended a program this summer you'd have seen, others you will have to wait to experience in 2026!

Thanks to a grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF), we were able to complete many renovations, and repairs to some key areas of camp as well as invest in some new spaces and equipment to ensure the lights stay on (literally) for years to come!

We would also like to thank the many people involved in all of these projects this years, as it goes well beyond the contractors or groups doing the building, but to all the staff and volunteers supporting the countless hours of moving supplies to (and sometimes from) the Island.

Here are some of the projects completed this season!

New Bunkie – built by Lasalle Secondary School Construction students to replace Forest Tent Platform

Dining Hall Renovations/Repairs – foundation work to replace aging and sinking cinder blocks, masonry work on the chimney, new wall and foundation around the walk in fridge as well as supporting some aging beams, a fresh coat of paint on 3 sides of the building, new handwash sink and eyewash station and new water filling station.

New Generator Shed and Generator – New combined generator shed and fuel bay complete with garage door entry and a new generator. The old generator to be used as back up system

New Roofs – New steel roofs on the office and maintenance shed

Boat Repairs – pre-season and In season repairs to all 3 boats to add new longevity to the fleet.

Decks – new decks added to Rainboth and North Rub-a-Dub

Thank you to all those involved in supporting the work on these projects and ensuring John Island remains a special place for children, youth and families to attend for years to come!

The Gary Project

As you may have seen in recent social media posts, we were able to have a small dedication of the newly renovated Chapel Point in recognition of Gary Gray and his contributions to John Island Camp over 25+ years!

Alumni Leadership Bursary A Growing Success

Continued Alumni Support Essential

Covid had a devastating effect on the leadership development programs of many overnight camps. When the alumni bursary program was instituted to attract age qualified campers into programs to become potential camp counsellors (Greenway and Norquay programs), it was met with success.

Alumni contributed to the bursary fund and in its two years of operation, nine candidates have been awarded bursaries. As knowledge of the program grows, the number of applicants has increased. Awareness programs start at camp with those in the Greenway program and with campers who would age qualify for the leadership programs in the following year.

Key to the program is that it is not a subsidy, but an award earned by qualifying teens who make the effort to meet the criteria for the bursary. Selection of those receiving the bursary is made by a task group of alumni and senior camp staff.

For 2026, information has been made available to all those interested in the program with the first application deadline set for February 28, 2026. Bursary amounts of up to \$500 for those registered for the Greenway program and up to \$1,000 for those applying for the Norquay program will be considered. The bursary awards are applied to the fees for campers when they register for their leadership program.

Donations toward the bursary program can be made on line and must be specifically marked for the Alumni Leadership Bursary Program when making the donation.

Celebrating an Incredible Summer at John Island!

This past summer at John Island was nothing short of amazing! Thanks to the dedication of our staff, volunteers, and supporters- especially our alumni, we welcomed more campers than last summer and on that, since reopening after the COVID-19 closure, camp participation has grown steadily year after year—a true testament to the resilience and passion of our community. Our surveys reflected outstanding feedback, with participants sharing how impactful and memorable their experiences were.

One of the most inspiring aspects of this season was the impact of our Fill the Bus campaign. The funds raised made it possible for campers from across the region to attend at a rate they could afford, ensuring that financial barriers never stand in the way of accessing our programs and services. This is at the heart of our charitable purpose: creating opportunities for every child to experience the magic of camp. In total, we supported over \$120,000 in camper financial assistance. This includes campers from Sudbury Manitoulin Children's Foundation, campers from the community at Serpent River and any who apply for assistance throughout the registration process.

As we look ahead, the need is greater than ever. We are excited to announce that preparations for the 2026 Fill the Bus campaign are already underway. When I think about where my passion for environmental education began, my mind always drifts back across the North Channel to John Island Camp. As a former camper and counsellor, I learned early on that connection to nature is more than just spending time outdoors; it's about understanding our relationship to the land, to each other, and to the communities that depend on both.

Those experiences, along with growing up as the daughter of an outdoor education teacher, shaped my belief that environmental awareness must be rooted in experience. That lesson has stayed with me and continues to shape my work today. Alongside fellow JIC alum Laurel Gunning, I've spent the past 17 years developing outdoor education programs that bring this belief to life; Outdoors Club, the Girls Outdoors Reach Ahead Program, and, most recently, the Environment Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) at Elliot Lake Secondary School.

Elliot Lake has a remarkable story, one that mirrors resilience, renewal, and the power of environmental stewardship. Our city was born from one of the largest uranium discoveries in the world during the 1950s. For decades, Elliot Lake thrived as a mining town and was once the top producer of uranium globally. When the mines closed in the 1990s, the community faced a difficult transition. Over time, through remediation, ecological management, and a collective effort to redefine our identity, Elliot Lake emerged as *"The Jewel in the Wilderness."*

That transformation, from industrial hub to environmental example, inspired the Outdoor Education Program my dad, Mark Robinson, started in the late 1980s. His program laid the groundwork for generations of students to build a deeper connection to the land and to our community's evolving identity. Building on this foundation, and with the support of my friend and colleague Laurel Gunning, I was able to create a new initiative that carries that legacy forward, the Environment SHSM. Launched in 2022, the program connects students with local industries, community projects, and environmental initiatives that explore where we've come from, where we are, and where we're going as a sustainable and thriving community.

The most important part of the Environment SHSM is the opportunities it provides. Students visit post-secondary institutions, complete industry certifications and workshops at no cost, and one of the highlights is attending John Island Camp to earn certifications and collaborate with future leaders from SHSM programs across the Algoma District School Board.

For the past three years, our students have spent three days each June at John Island Camp. Many enjoy the experience so much that they apply for paid summer co-op positions, which count toward earning their Red Seal in the Environment sector. Over a dozen students have had these transformative summer experiences, returning to school in September bursting with stories, pride, and newfound confidence.

The Environment SHSM bridges the sciences and social sciences, allowing students to explore everything from ecology and environmental policy to sustainability and social responsibility. It's not just about science; it's about developing leaders who understand the environmental, cultural, and social dimensions of community growth.

Ultimately, the goal of the Environment SHSM and the partnerships it's fostering is to give today's youth in Elliot Lake the same spark that John Island Camp gave me: the confidence to lead, the curiosity to explore, and the commitment to care for the land we call home.



This summer at John Island was one that we'll both remember forever. As Greenway leaders, we had the incredible opportunity to return to a place that once shaped us as campers and now lead the next generation through those same experiences. The summer was filled with laughter, memories, hard work, growth, and a deeper appreciation for the outdoors that connects us all together.

One of the highlights of our summer was leading not one, but two canoe trips down the Spanish River. This river already holds a special place in our hearts as we both paddled it in 2022 when we were Greenways ourselves. Returning to that river as leaders was a big accomplishment for us. It feels like it was just yesterday when we were Greenways ourselves learning how to run whitewater rapids and what it means to be a leader. It was surreal to paddle the same stretches of water, this time guiding campers who were experiencing it all for the first time.

Each trip brought its own set of challenges. We faced long days of paddling, long portages, broken seats, and the usual unpredictability of weather. But those challenges also brought out the best for everyone and tested their mental and physical strength. We watched our campers grow stronger and more confident each day. When the group worked together to set up camp after a long day of paddling and was so eager to help and take the initiative, it reminded us of how important the value of teamwork and leadership is on an out trip. Seeing each group of campers thrive and succeed in these areas of leadership made us feel so proud and accomplished knowing that they will come out of this with all these new skills learned.

Leading canoe trips is never just about paddling. It's about patience, flexibility, and learning to read a group's needs as much as you read a river's current. We both gained many leadership skills on our own Greenway and Norquay trip as campers. Some of those include balancing leadership and empathy, learning when to step back, when to step up, and how to create space for our peers to lead too. Watching our Greenway's this year learn those skills and apply them every day was one of the most rewarding parts of the summer.

For both of us, the greatest feeling as leaders was seeing our campers succeed. Whether it was a perfectly executed J-stroke when learning to stern, building a fire for the first time, or running their first rapid, these moments reminded us why the Greenway program is so special. It gives young people the chance to discover not only the outdoors, but also what they're capable of when things get hard.

As leaders, we came away from the summer with renewed gratitude. For the wilderness, for our campers and the guardians of the campers who trusted us, and for the John Island community that continues to inspire growth year after year. This summer taught us that leadership is not about perfection; it's about connection, resilience, and teamwork.

We are both beyond thankful for every early morning, every paddle, every laugh around the fire, and every lesson this summer had to teach us. The Spanish River will always be a place of challenge and beauty, but most importantly, it's where we learned, once again, what it means to be a good leader and role model.
